## Official Opening of Anglican Senior Centre (Havelock)

### Building a Community for Seniors of Havelock View

Singapore Anglican Community Services (SACS) officially opened its seventh active ageing centre, Anglican Senior Centre (ASC) [Havelock], on 3 December 2022 to meet the growing needs of the ageing population.

ASC [Havelock] is conveniently located within the Havelock community so that seniors can easily participate in social and recreational activities to stay active and build a healthy social network. ASC [Havelock] also offers services such as befriending and buddying, as well as the provision of information and referrals to care services.

*"I am so grateful to Singapore Anglican Community Services for setting up the Anglican Senior Centre at Havelock. I know that especially during COVID-19, you continued to serve our residents with heart, encouraged them and assured them that they were not alone. One very good example is Auntie Lim who had a fall two years ago and hurt her back as well as pelvis. Even after she recovered, Auntie Lim became fearful of stepping out of the house. Staff and volunteers of the centre encouraged her and accompanied her for her medical appointments and rehabilitation sessions which built up her confidence. Auntie Lim now actively participates in the centre's activities. She even requests transport to pick her up from the centre to her physiotherapy sessions, instead of her HDB flat's void deck. The centre has become a second home of love and joy for Auntie Lim and other seniors in the community. I am also very happy that the centre has brought in community partners, such as St Matthew's Church, to serve the seniors and organise meaningful activities for them."*

# Active Ageing

Seniors such as Ms Geok Yan, a regular at ASC (Havelock), has even become a volunteer at the centre. During the art and craft activities, the centre noticed that Geok Yan is very good at classic calligraphy and invited her to teach calligraphy to the children at My First Skool @ Havelock.

An inter-generational collaboration between ASC (Havelock) and My First Skool @ Havelock, the children also put up festive celebrations as well as song and dance performances once a month via Zoom for the seniors. Together with

their parents, the children also handcrafted gifts for the seniors. With Geok Yan coming on board, ASC (Havelock) planned a calligraphy workshop for children in the kindergarten. The one-hour session included a pre-recorded video of Geok Yan who taught and demonstrated calligraphy writing of A to Z to the children, and a Zoom session where Geok Yan interacted with them and guided them in calligraphy writing. The children enjoyed the calligraphy workshop so much that My First Skool gifted Geok Yan with a painting by the children as well as an appreciation certificate.

In 2022, ASC (Havelock) also partnered National Arts Council and Singapore Chinese Cultural Centre to conduct a story-telling workshop for 18 seniors. Entitled "Telling Your Stories, Sharing Your Memories", the weekly workshop, conducted from 2 September 2022 to 2 December 2022, aimed to equip the seniors with effective communication tools to express themselves and encouraged reminiscence in the seniors through a visit to the Singapore Chinese Cultural Centre. Importantly, the workshop created opportunities for the seniors to create stronger bonds with one another through creative story-making, story-telling and drama activities.

# A Heart for Senior Care

In designing spaces and amenities to support senior care, St. Andrew's Mission Hospital (SAMH) responds to the evolving needs and expectations of the older person. At the core of what we do is how good the silver generation can live and age well in an inclusive society.

We strive to improve our person-centred senior care by including spatial designs that support long-term residential, nursing and rehabilitation care in the two new nursing homes and three new senior care centres. We have also included other social, lifestyle and recreation amenities for seniors and families in the new facilities. The location for the senior care centres will provide accessible one-stop service for seniors and their caregivers, providing seniors an option to age in place and stay connected to their communities.

# St. Andrew's Mission Hospital from 1913 to 2023

Today's health and community care landscape in Singapore is an interconnected network of care support. A vastly different scene from 1913 where Singapore along with Malacca and Penang were the three trading ports under the British East India Company. The land of opportunities which attracted our forefathers revealed a different state for the local inhabitants. Then, social infrastructure and care could not keep pace with the booming entrepot trade. It was the unmet needs of the local population, especially Asian women and children, that birthed the earliest iteration of St. Andrew's Mission Hospital (SAMH).

Out of passion to care for the physical, emotional and social well-being of the community, Dr Charlotte Ferguson-Davie, a medical doctor and the wife of the first Anglican Bishop of Singapore, responded to these needs by setting up a dispensary along Bencoolen Street for destitute women and children. SAMH subsequently grew hand in hand with Singapore's developments. We stay focused to the needs of vulnerable with our pulse in the community. The early trademark of our legacy is what SAMH continues to do today - serving where needs are the greatest.



One of many well-received initiatives she started is a Rhythm Wellness (Drumming) Group. Joyce first received training in percussion music appreciation in 2019. She then started the drumming group in SANH (Buangkok) for residents, and subsequently trained and empowered other care team members to lead the drumming sessions as well. The drumming group is a highlight for the residents, and the positive feedback they receive for their performances often

boosts their confidence and re-energises them to face and overcome their daily struggles.

Joyce’s dedication to the residents goes beyond her scope of care. She relished in the joy of the residents when they enjoyed their favourite treats she bought for their weekly ‘makan’ sessions.

**Joyce shared,**

*“The treats are particularly appealing to residents in advanced stages of dementia who are withdrawn and have poor appetites. The familiar flavours and fragrance of the local treats remind them of their past.”*

# Gardens of Life



Recognising that greenery contributes to a person's mental, physical and emotional well-being, St. Andrew's Nursing Home (SANH) [Buangkok, Henderson, Queenstown, Taman Jurong] and St. John's – St. Margaret's Nursing Home (SJSJ NH) have gardens to provide a tranquil and conducive environment for the Care Teams to engage residents in rehabilitative and social activities.

## SANH (Buangkok)

Community in Bloom Awards 2021: **Gold Award;**  
**Outstanding Ornamental Garden Achievement Ribbon**

It is the first nursing home in Singapore to be accredited with the Landscape Excellence Assessment Framework (LEAF) certification by the National Parks Board, in recognition of its efforts in promoting community wellbeing as well as biodiversity conservation.

Besides physiotherapy activities, residents are regularly engaged through gardening activities such as seeding, weeding and harvesting edible plants.

The garden was enhanced in 2022 to create more conducive space for group recreational therapy and therapeutic horticulture programme, facilitating cosier interaction between residents and care team members.

### Ms Karen Chua,

Senior Medical Social Worker, SANH (Henderson) shared,

*"We observed that a peaceful morning stroll in the garden can uplift the mood of our residents and calm their anxieties. Some of our residents are also more enthusiastic in participating in activities conducted in the garden."*





# Supporting the Community



Initiated by Boon Lay Community Club, St. Andrew's Nursing Home [SANH] (Taman Jurong) and Anglican Care Centre [ACC] (Bukit Batok) collaborated with Boon Lay Zone C Residents' Network to co-organize a health screening for residents living around Blk 260 Boon Lay Drive. The event was graced by Mr Desmond Lee, Minister for National Development and Minister-in-charge of Social Services Integration, who interacted with the residents and participated in the health screening.

The health screening aimed to detect potential medical conditions in residents early and encouraged them to seek professional help early through providing information on medical conditions as well as referral services.

Conducted by team members of SANH (Taman Jurong) and ACC (Bukit Batok), the health screening covered basic health screening tests such as body mass index, blood glucose and blood pressure, as well as mental wellness screening using assessment tools such as Even Briefer Assessment Scale for Depression (EBAS-DEP) and Abbreviated Mental Test (AMT) for Dementia. 45 residents were screened for dementia using AMT for Dementia and 7% was diagnosed with early signs of dementia. 60 residents were screened for depression using EBAS-DEP and 10% was diagnosed with depressive disorder. Team members of SANH (Taman Jurong) and ACC (Bukit Batok) explained the health screening results to the residents and also provided tips on maintaining and improving their mental wellness.

With the health screening being well received by residents, Boon Lay Community Club is looking forward to organising another health screening to serve another cluster of Boon Lay residents.

# Empowering Youth to Find Hope

SACS Psychiatric Services has been an early proponent of psychiatric care for young people. Drawing on its experiences in age specific care, on 1 April 2022, the Youth Services began providing even earlier therapeutic interventions for teenagers, aged 13 onwards.

Many youths grapple with mental health related issues in their developmental stage of life and are also facing increasing challenges from the impact of social media and peer pressure.

Adolescence spanning different phases until aged 24 is a significant developmental period when youths begin to explore their sense of self-worth. Lack of resolution to adverse childhood events or reconciliation of the challenging transitions into young adulthood can at times contribute greatly to the development of mental health conditions.



Recognising the need to multiply support through broad-based engagement of young people, on 1 April 2023, SACS Psychiatric Services - Youth Services became part of the Agency for Integrated Care (AIC) CREST-Youth (Youth Community Outreach Team) Programme, serving youths in the North-East Region. This is a programme whereby mental health service providers serve as a community safety network for youths-at-risk or with mental health conditions and their caregivers who need the additional support to care for their loved ones in the community.

By providing support, care and concern for the youths, the SACS Youth Services Team hopes to empower them in building resilience and self-confidence to manage their life stressors. The team provides services such as psycho-education, case management, counselling for both youths and their families, groupwork and various youth programmes. As part of its preventive intervention efforts, the team seeks to network with grassroots organisations and schools to organise talks and workshops on mental health conditions, communication skills, stress management skills and good mental well-being strategies for youths and their families.



**Jen\*** is one of the youths who had been empowered to find hope in her life. Jen struggled with low self-esteem, anxiety and relationship issues.



A counsellor journeyed with her and helped her to gain deeper insights into her emotions and unresolved life experiences. Today, Jen is a confident young woman who has regained personal mastery of her emotional and mental state.

# Empowering Residents of Anglican Family Centre

Anglican Family Centre (AFC), a crisis shelter that provides a safe temporary abode for women-in-crisis and their children, aims to empower its residents towards independent living.

In October 2021, AFC launched its pilot Social Enterprise Project which raised a total of \$8,762 through the sales of plants, Christmas cards, Christmas tags and fashion accessories created by AFC residents. Over 90% of the proceeds benefitted 15 participating families.

In October 2022, AFC embarked on its second Social Enterprise (SE) Project: **A Fresh Creation 2022**. The intention of the SE project is to empower. Many of the AFC residents have limited income with little or no savings. A Fresh Creation looked at financial, emotional and aspiration empowerment. Significantly, the fundraising initiative created bonds and networks amongst the residents and all who participated.



**Sales of terrariums and floral arrangements created by residents as well as cookies baked together with volunteers from St Andrew's House raised a total of \$11,122.32.**

**90%** of the sale proceeds benefitted 20 families comprising single mothers and 30 children who participated in the project.

Ground up support is also a lifeline to AFC. A committed group of individuals - Ms Joanne Heng and Ms Ho Kim Hua - taught the residents to bake, create floral frames and arrangements respectively. Within SACS internal network, Ms Patricia Aw and SACS Integrated Employment Service donated the materials required for the project. Many colleagues supported the cause by purchasing the items or helping to spread the word.

I hope other women without a job can also learn a new skill."*

**Mdm "Y"**, 38 years old, with 4 children aged 9 to 16 years old, commented,

*"This is my second time participating in the social enterprise project with my children. Besides helping me to cope with my financial needs, this project has helped me to regain my confidence. Through this project, I learnt life skills which my children and I could use in the future. We are grateful to be part of this meaningful project."*

Anchored in God's unfailing love, St. Andrew's Mission Hospital (SAMH) and Singapore Anglican Community Services (SACS) have been caring for the vulnerable since 1913 and 1967 respectively.
