Extending the Arm of *Autism Services*

ST. ANDREW'S NEW AUTISM SCHOOL (NATIONAL CURRICULUM)

The Ministry of Education (MOE) announced in December 2020 that St. Andrew's Autism Centre (SAAC) will soon operate a new special education (SPED) school for children and youths on the autism spectrum who are able to access the national curriculum for primary and secondary levels.

This new school seeks to provide its students with a well-rounded education, founded in the national curriculum, while preparing its students for life through the development of independent living and vocational skills.

The ministry's appointment is an affirmation of SAAC's good work in the autism community, and recognition of SAAC's commitment to journey alongside families with members on the autism spectrum, improving the quality of life of those we serve.

Beginning with 75 places per cohort, the new school will open its doors to its first batch of Primary One students in 2022, with a capacity for 500 primary and 350 post-primary places at steady state. It will be temporarily housed at the soon-to-be-vacated Yusof Ishak Secondary School in Bukit Batok when it begins operations next year. Its permanent site at Clementi is slated to be ready in 2027.

Since the announcement, SAAC's team has been working hard towards the commencement of the school in January 2022. With different teams paired with MOE counterparts, work on refurbishing the interim campus, determining admissions criteria and processes, finalising the curriculum, publicity and hiring plans has begun. These plans were shared and well-received at an engaging first open house which took place virtually on 13 March 2021 with more than 160 participants.

SERVING THE NEEDS OF THE AGEING POPULATION

Aligned with the needs of the ageing population, St. Andrew's Mission Hospital (SAMH) and Singapore Anglican Community Services (SACS) have been expanding its eldercare services to serve more seniors.

ST. JOHN'S - ST. MARGARET'S NURSING HOME

Located within the Dover community, St. John's – St. Margaret's Nursing Home looks forward to receiving its first resident in July 2021.

It will provide care for 273 nursing home residents and over 80 seniors at its co-located Senior Care Centre.

The Ministry of Health (MOH) has appointed SAMH to be the integrated operator of a nursing home and senior care centre in Tampines North, as well as a pair of Active Ageing Hubs (AAHs) in Bedok.

ST. ANDREW'S NURSING HOME (TAMPINES NORTH) AND CO-LOCATED ST. ANDREW'S SENIOR CARE (TAMPINES NORTH)

Construction is underway for St. Andrew's Nursing Home (Tampines North), which will provide long-term residential, nursing and rehabilitation care for 277 residents, whilst its co-located senior care centre will serve up to 60 day care clients.

The nursing home and its co-located senior care centre is slated to begin operations in December 2022 and first quarter of 2023 respectively.

ST. ANDREW'S SENIOR CARE (BEDOK NORTH) AND ST. ANDREW'S SENIOR CARE (BEDOK SOUTH)

The AAHs at Bedok North (left) and Bedok South (right) aim to open their doors in the first quarter of 2022 to provide general and dementia day care to 60 and 100 clients respectively. Community rehabilitation, home care, and active ageing services will be offered at the centres as well.



With our new and upcoming nursing homes and senior care centres, SAMH and SACS will be able to serve a total of more than 2,000 nursing home residents and 600 day care clients islandwide by 2023.

ST. ANDREW'S NURSING HOME (ALJUNIED)

SAMH was also appointed by MOH as the operator of a Build-Own-Lease (BOL) nursing home in Aljunied.

The nine-storey nursing home, slated to begin operations in 2023, will provide long-term nursing and rehabilitation care to 342 residents.

DEMENTIA-FRIENDLY THERAPEUTIC GARDEN

Officially opened on 5 February 2021, St. Andrew's Nursing Home (Buangkok)'s Dementia-friendly Therapeutic Garden provides a sanctuary within the nursing home where residents and staff can find respite in nature.

Catered for residents with dementia and other mental health conditions, the purpose-built garden which spans around 600 square metres provides welcoming paths and open spaces for visitors to relax in its therapeutic environment.

The therapeutic garden was mooted as a result of evidence-based research which showed that residents and patients who are in touch with nature tend to experience less stress, be in better mood and have better cognitive skills. In this garden, residents can be stimulated by the colours, smell, and texture of flowers and leaves, which helps them feel more relaxed and engaged.

Imbued with 78 different species of plants, the garden is divided into 6 different zones: Smell, Hearing, Reminiscence, Taste, Touch and Sight zones.



At the entrance of garden, one will be greeted with the fragrance emanating from the Variegated Crepe Jasmine, Orange Cempaka and Golden Gardenia flowers in the **Smell Zone**.

Further down at the **Hearing Zone**, grassy plants trigger rustling sounds as the wind blow. An installed bamboo musical feature also augments the sounds within the zone whenever residents interact with it.



Upon approaching the **Taste Zone**, one will see vegetable plots where residents and visitors engage in gardening activities. Edible plants such as mint, basil, brinjal and lady's fingers, are grown here and subsequently used in the Home's occupational therapy cooking sessions for residents.



Last but not least is the **Sight Zone**, where plants with warm and bright colours are grown. Here, the experience of the garden culminates into a multi-sensory experience with the smell of the flowers, the trickling sound of water from a water feature and the sensation of walking on a soft lawn of carpet grass.

The residents are likely to be thrilled by the **Reminiscence Zone** which follows after, where plants such as the Lotus, Chinese Hibiscus, White Bougainvillea and Fragrant Pandan may bring back memories of their younger days.

The Reminiscence Zone features plants that are familiar to the older generation, including plants with cultural significance or common uses for culinary purposes.



At the **Touch Zone**, residents can touch the leaves and flowers of plants which come in various shapes, sizes and textures. A variety of plants with different colours and forms are showcased, such as Ixora 'Super Pink' and Ixora 'Super Orange'.

The Touch Zone also includes a water feature and stone path. The bubbling water feature welcomes visitors to touch the water and enjoy the cooling sensation. In addition to providing a therapeutic effect, walking on the stone path helps improve one's balance and reduces stress and tension.



With the nursing home's planned activity of leisure in the Therapeutic Garden under the Agency for Integrated Care (AIC) Wellness Support Programme (WSP), the garden provides a place for social interaction between residents and staff. Residents can look forward to strolling or enjoying a game of chess in the serenity of the garden, as well as sipping a cup of coffee at the specially constructed mobile Sarabat stall in the Reminiscence Zone. In future, SANH (Buangkok) also looks forward to holding Therapeutic Horticulture Programmes in this new garden.

Minister Sun toured the facilities of AFC and learnt how the Centre fosters relationships among the residents, helping them to build up their self-confidence and reintegrate into society.

A Journey of Hope and Recovery

Seeking a breakthrough from her struggles, Ms. Ang Seck Poh sought residential mental health rehabilitation at Anglican Care Centre (ACC) (Simei) in September 2017. With the support of the counsellors and programmes at ACC (Simei), Ms. Ang has since been discharged and is now journeying forward in life with a new hope for the future.

"After being admitted to ACC (Simei), I learnt to actively manage my delusional disorder and aggression through residential rehabilitation programmes. For example, the Wellness Management Recovery Programme taught me the importance of timely and proper medication. This helped me to better control my condition and improve my mental health.

While my journey has been challenging, I am proud to have secured and sustained employment in the food and beverage industry with assistance from the Employment Specialist at ACC (Simei). With support and encouragement from my supervisor at work, my self-confidence gradually increased and I received an award for sustained employment at ACC (Simei)'s Employability Night!

Although I am an introvert, I have forged precious friendships with staff and fellow peers at ACC (Simei). Upon my discharge from ACC (Simei) in September 2020, my company converted me to full time employment!"

INDIVIDUAL AWARDS

198 healthcare professionals from St. Andrew's Mission Hospital (SAMH) and Singapore Anglican Community Services (SACS) received the Hero Award, while Dr. Shaun Gerald Nathan, Resident Physician, St. Andrew's Community Hospital (SACH); and Ms. Chai Chew Moey, Senior Nurse Manager, St. Andrew's Nursing Home (SANH) (Henderson), received the Super Hero Award at the Virtual Award Ceremony on 29 March 2021.

Dr. Shaun Gerald Nathan, Resident Physician, St. Andrew's Community Hospital

At the start of the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic, Dr. Shaun was selected from the SACH palliative care team to assist Changi General Hospital (CGH) EagleCare, a programme providing end-of-life care for CGH's partnering nursing homes, where he helped to set up protocols, provided direct and telehealth cover, and took part in swab operations. He also supported the St. Andrew's Nursing Homes (SANHs) in its clinical reviews of the residents, and started a system to ensure that end-of-life needs of residents were looked after during the pandemic. Going beyond the call of duty, he even went down to the nursing homes after office hours with medication for residents to help manage their medical conditions on many occasions.

With his initiative and great sense of responsibility, Dr. Shaun has made a lasting impact in his work with EagleCare and the SANHs.

SNIPPING AWAY THE SHADES

Stepping into a hairdresser salon is something that most of us do regularly, with some even enjoying their trips for the trim. However, this seemingly mundane routine is often an overlooked challenge for adults on the autism spectrum. Trips to the hairdresser are a challenge especially for those who have hypersensitive sensory issues and their families. Each trip may end up in a huge struggle and possibly uncut hair, with families finding themselves in awkward situations at times.

Irene and her fellow hairdressers from various salons understood the dilemma that families faced. In November 2020, they approached Day Activity Centre (Siglap) and offered to volunteer their skills. With the help of coaches, they trimmed the hair of 12 clients with swift precision.



Despite the heat of donning a Personal Protective Equipment gown when working closely with the clients as a requirement, Kim, Keith, Irene and Avery did so without complaints. Their patience paid off, and each client walked away looking sharp and happy.



ENDING 2020 WITH A MELODY OF HOPE

Many plans were disrupted when COVID-19 hit the shores of Singapore last year, including the fundraising concert plans in February that Ms. Dawn Marie Toh had in mind for SAAC. However, this disruption did not dampen the spirits of Dawn and her fellow performers.
